#### ★ Meiji Restoration (1868 -1912)

- Trafficking of women was restricted
- Women were allowed to request divorces
- All children get an elementary education
- "Good Wife, Wise Mother"

#### ★ Post World War II Era


- 1945 women received the right to vote
- Section of the new constitution drafted in 1946 was dedicated to guarantee gender equality.
- ★ Women's Liberation (1960s-1980s)
  - Based off Radical Feminism in the USA and New Left in Japan
  - Free both sexes from patriarchal society and Capitalism
  - Access to birth control
- ★ 1990s-present
  - Sexual Harassment rights
  - Inequality in workplace
    - Maternity leave/Child care access
    - Equal Pay
